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### What is a secret?



Something private, kept away – ANONYMOUS

confidential information – ANONYMOUS

Not for public sharing – ANONYMOUS

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### How would YOU define secrets management?

Meta-secret – ANONYMOUS

Being able to securely manage secrets in a way that is scalable – ANONYMOUS

Keep secrets secure while making them available for those who need them – ANONYMOUS

Machine Credentials / Service accounts / – ANONYMOUS

Not pmp – ANONYMOUS

Cert private keys – ANONYMOUS

Something that can actually handle proper rotation, revocation, and elevation / auditing – ANONYMOUS

### Why is proper secrets management important to individuals and organizations?

For use in automations and software builds, and scripts. Allowing a central place to consume and update secrets allows us to change our credentials regularly for security purposes – JULIAN, ADAM

bc security – ANONYMOUS

I don't want anyone to know my secrets :( – ANONYMOUS

SUNBURST – ANONYMOUS

information in the wrong hands can be very damaging (reputation or financially for example) to an organization – ANONYMOUS

Someone can then learn your secrets and share your secrets to everyone – ANONYMOUS

So secrets are not hard-coded in scripts or sitting on file systems in config files – MABUQU2

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### What types of Secrets do you manage?

Life, the universe, and everything (access tokens, deploy tokens, GitLab access, Financial system access, etc.) – TONY BROOK

FERPA-protected info – ANONYMOUS

SSL certs (private keys in particular) – ANONYMOUS

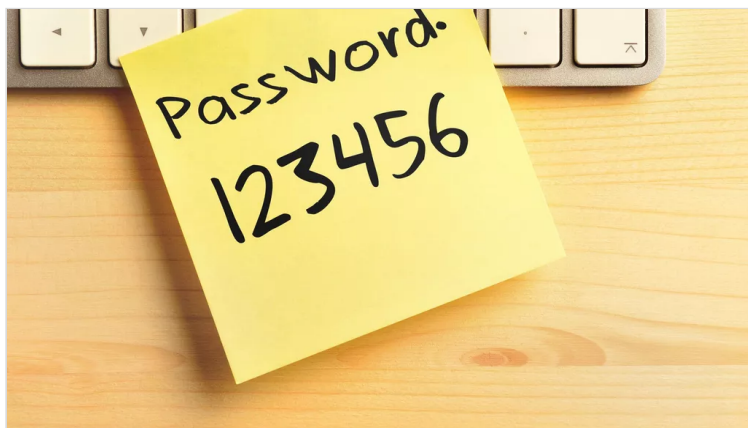
client secrets for app integrations – ANONYMOUS

Ssl private keys, api access keys, tokens. Any secret that is owned or shared across a team – MABUQU2

Root or administrator passwords for windows/Linux operating systems – MABUQU2

LAPS – ANONYMOUS

## How do you / have you seen people managing secrets? (enterprise or personal)



Usually hard coded into scripts when I have to report them to the ISO – TONY BROOK

LastPass / BitWarden – ANONYMOUS

Password managers (bitwarden, pmp, etc.) – ANONYMOUS

browser based pwd managers are popular with users – ANONYMOUS

Hashicorp Vault / CyperArk Conjure – ANONYMOUS

PMP, MBAM, AD for LAPS – ANONYMOUS

Pmp for work related, non personal creds. KeePassxc for personal owned creds. – MABUQU2

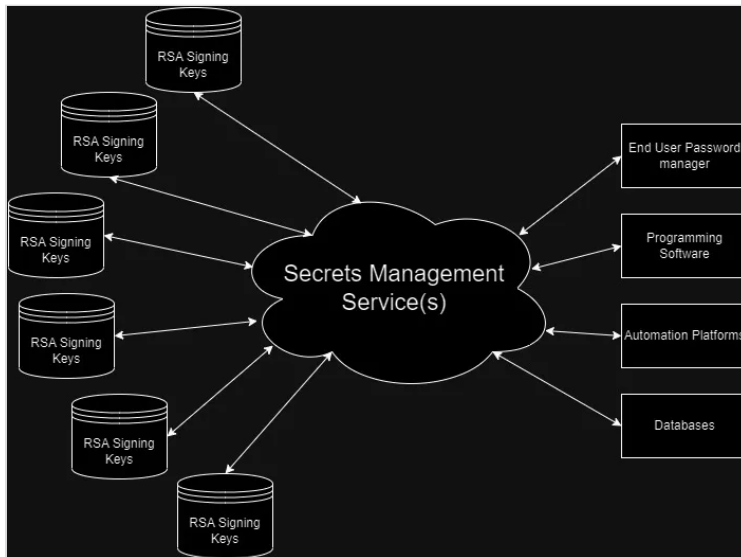
Mother-in-law loves piece of paper in a binder – ANONYMOUS

different tiers of passwords (bank info vs online shopping log ins) – ANONYMOUS

Personally I use a private KeePass database, with the key vault stored in a private Dropbox with a 48-character password. Lately i've tied this into my Yubikey OTP. I also have my Authenticators tied into the yubikey. – TONY BROOK

### How can we better manage our secrets as individuals?

We need a proper secrets manager based on open source and auditable code that can be integrated via API into our build tools, CI/CD pipelines, Ansible, Authentication tools, Splunk for logging, and Orion for monitoring – TONY BROOK

Not use the same password for everything – ANONYMOUS

training end users on best practice (no post it notes, secure password creation) – ANONYMOUS

Buy LastPass Family edition for your parents. – ANONYMOUS

For those who don't know, GitLab does secrets detection and limited SASL. If we get more support for it, we may even get to the Ultimate level, which does even more secrets management. – TONY BROOK
